

Sundays Multiclub BBQ at Laanecoorie attracted 10 including wives and a dog from Ballarat..


But Hey, we had a good time at a great location and tons of good food and interaction with the other clubs

Propagation Report for September 2007

HF Bands

There has not been too much in the way of propagation over the past month. Some DX has been heard on the 40m band in the late afternoon with several VK's working into Europe and North America. John VK3AIG reports he has been active on 160m using CW with contacts to several States in VK.

VHF and Above

Limited openings have occurred over the past few weeks. Kevin Vk3WN reports having contacts with Joe VK7JG from Launceston and Peter VK5ZLX near the Barossa Valley. Kevin also reports hearing the Launceston 2m beacon on a number of occasions.

Activity on the 144.150MHz Wednesday net beginning at 8:30pm is constant however conditions have not been all that favourable. Ian VK3IDL reported working Robbie VK3EK the net controller from Bairnsdale on both 2m and 70cm last Wednesday evening. When the net has completed local stations shift up to 144.250 for a local chat. Around 8 stations are can be heard which include VK3KQB, VK3AIG, VK3GND, VK3CMC, VK3IDL, VK3AXH and a couple of extras from Colac VK3MCW and VK3AAK from the Mornington Peninsula. Often some of the group will have contacts on 70cm and 23cm.

The VHF/UHF Spring Field Day is planned for the weekend after the BARG hamvention so why not get out your portable stuff and join in the fun.

Construction Group

Thanks to Brian VK3KQB for his efforts with the Audio Amplifier kits. I believe most of them are now working and will be a useful device to have around the shack. The next limited project is being put together and is an RF milliwattmeter for use by those members interested in some of the microwave bands. Propagation Report for October 2007

HF Bands

Again not a great deal to report. This is mainly due to the low sunspot cycle having a significant effect on propagation. However I have received reports from VK3SE indicating some contacts on bands including 21 and 28Mhz. There has also been reported activity from VK3KQB and VK3AIG that signals from within VK and ZL can often be heard in the evenings.

VHF/UHF Bands

Well things have been relatively quiet on these bands again this month. VK3WN and VK3AXH have been active on SSB with contacts into VK1,

VK3 and VK5 on 2m and some qso's with VK3YLV in Horsham and VK3LY at Nhill on 70cm

Steve VK3SE reported being involved in a qso using 2m SSB early in October with VK7OW, VK6AI, VK5MFW/mobile and VK2BLS around 4pm one afternoon.

EME QSO by VK3IDL....Congratulations to Ian VK3IDL for his first Eme qso with Japanese station JH0MHE. Ian was using his home brew two stacked yagis and around 100 watts of power which is a great effort.

Parts were distributed and several have now completed the RF head so it won't be long before some calibration is required. Mast – No further progress due to Jeff VK3PAP being away

Beacons – Due to commitments no change to the 70cm and 1296MHz beacons until next month.

Repeaters – Ian VK3AXH reports no further progress with the Ben Nevis repeater due to other commitments. Same situation with VK3RBA.

BEFORE STEREOPHONIC.

I find it hard to believe that sixty odd years has passed since we listened to mainly "78" mono records reproduced on valve type radiograms using mainly magnetic "pickups". Tape recorders were few and far between and "45 and 33 1/3" were not yet available.

Some time in the early 1950's, but exactly when I can not recall, the Ballarat Radio Society arranged a demonstration of a new system of recording for the reproduction of "Live Sound".

The demonstration of "Binaural" took place at the Alexandria on Lydiard Street and was presented by Ibbott Sound Systems from Melbourne.

The "Binaural System" was amazing to all present and the audience included local amateurs and guests from the South Western Zone of the WIA.

Separate audio amplifiers were connected to two sets of Hi Fi loud speakers set a distance apart in the hall.

Separate heads, one for each amplifier, were mounted side by side upon a common arm fitted to a turntable. A disc with two recorded tracks, arranged apart so that the distance of separation could be matched by the separation between the two heads, reproduced the sound fed to the two amplifiers. The recording system producing the record used two microphones spaced a specific distance apart to make the two individual tracks and the distance was used to space the loud speaker systems apart.

During the demonstration Mr. Ibbott played recordings of footsteps passing by, vehicles and a train traveling past, Ping Pong Balls and other sounds made by movements and the affect was magical. The final demonstration was of a recording of an orchestra performing a rendition of a symphonic piece with the various instruments taking their part as they were directed by the conductor so that the reproduced sounds appeared to leave the speakers and take their places as if they were in the room. Every one was amazed except for an amateur called Tony Wilson, VK3ZAZ from Glenthompson who was perplexed and shook his head saying that something was wrong. Finally he decided that the fiddles were on the wrong side. Mr. Ibbott swapped over the cables to the heads and replayed the piece. The fiddles were in the right place and Tony was happy with the result!

The cartridges used in the turntable heads were Crystal types, using Rochelle Salts, I think, and I believe made by the Company.

Of course the head distance had to be exact to get the two sounds in sync. Not a simple task. The reproduction from the system sounded superior to the present day Stereophonic reproduction but I guess we lay people would not know the difference and enjoy what we have today.
