VHF and Above for November 2015

The weather is getting warmer and propagation is starting to show some signs of improvement in regard to increased distances for contacts. Use can be made of the Hepburn Propagation Charts to help determine the likelihood of contacts between your location and others active stations. Daily updates for this information can be found on the local VK-Logger website which is easy to navigate once you have registered and logged in. <u>WWW.vklogger.com/</u>

This month it is pleasing to see some activity from Eugene VK3FEUG and Bob VK3NBV on the lower end of the 2 metre band and 70cm band. Eugene was active during the VHF/UHF Field Day weekend on 14/15th November and was heard exchanging numbers with numerous stations. With the increased propagation distances Bob was heard on 2m SSB contacting VK5JR in Mount Gambier. Both stations although using vertically polarised antenna's were still having good results.

Regular club members VK3PMG, VK3AIG, VK3KG and VK3AXH can be heard most mornings from 8am onwards on the lower end of 2m and if conditions are good enough then the higher bands are given a go. This month has seen good openings to VK5's Mt Gambier and Adelaide areas on 2m through to 1296MHz.

VK3BML's 1296MHz beacon is running again still with some issues to be resolved but has been heard in Mt Gambier at S8. It will remain in operation along with the 70cm beacon through the summer DX season.

John VK3AIG and Ian VK3AXH took part in the Spring VHF/UHF field day in the 8 hour portable section from Mt Hollowback on all bands from 6 metres to 10GHz. The weather was very windy but we managed to have several contacts on all bands. John although only running around 40mW on 3400 MHz was able to have contacts with VK3ER at McLaughlan's lookout in the Wombat Forest. VK3KQ at Enfield and VK3ALB at Mt Gellibrand near Colac...not bad for a low powered mircrowave setup.

Again members are encouraged to get involved in the challenge of the higher bands by making a simple yagi for 2m and 70cm and get amongst the fun. Mick VK3PMG at Stawell is using a 5 element yagi regularly having contacts into Mt Gambier, Cobram and to Adelaide.

Beacons play an important role as an indicator of propagation as well. Info can be found on the VKlogger website for locations and operating frequencies. As most beacons are GPS locked you can also use them to check the accuracy of you rig's frequency readout.
